




#### **Achievement Data**

#### **Finance Chair Letter**

This year, the Five Town Community School District has presented a total requested budget that represents a 6.09% increase in the overall impact to taxpayers. Our school district is not immune from the rising costs on everything from energy prices to facility repairs. The Board and administration have worked to minimize the impact to taxpayers while crafting a budget that provides our students a vibrant and engaging education, supports our incredible educators and school staff, and takes care of critical maintenance needs.

The budget also reflects changes to streamline our accounting process. Currently, the Camden Rockport Schools District pays the Five Town CSD \$1.3 million for shared expenses. Instead of showing this as a negative expense, we are moving to a revenue-based approach. While this budget shows a 17.3% expense increase, this is made up by the corresponding increase in revenue from the shared expenses. There is no change to taxpayer impact from this accounting change.

The Board has held multiple public deliberations on the budget. As always, our budget process is guided by our strategic plan, what is best for students and educators, and what is fair to taxpayers. We encourage continued community engagement on the budget and invite you to learn more about the budget on the district's website, attend public meetings, ask questions, and understand how your tax dollars are being spent to support the powerful teaching and learning in our district.






